

<p><b>FY22 Priorities Included:</b></p>	<p><b>Funding for FPWA Budget Priorities in the FY22 Adopted Budget:</b></p>	<p><b>Other Notable Human Services Investments:</b></p>
<p><b>Funding for Early Childcare and Education/Youth Services:</b></p> <p><b>\$10 million</b> for approximately 1,000 new full-day family childcare slots for infants &amp; toddlers.</p> <p><b>\$17.5 million</b> to convert over 2,000 school-day/school-year slots for 3- and 4-year-old children to full-day/year-round slots.</p> <p><b>\$17.5 million</b> to expand center-based infant toddler capacity by approximately 700 slots.</p> <p><b>An increase in rates</b> for community-based Summer Rising providers to \$1,700 per student for elementary programs and \$925 per student for middle school programs.</p> <p><b>Funding for Aging Services:</b></p> <p><b>\$16.6 million</b> in new funding for home-delivered meals (\$13.6 million for weekday meals and \$3 million for weekend and holiday meals).</p> <p><b>Restoration of all discretionary funding</b> to pre-pandemic levels.</p> <p><b>Funding for the Nonprofit Human Services Sector:</b></p> <p><b>\$48 million</b> for a 3% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) for essential human services workers</p> <p><b>Full funding</b> of the Indirect Cost Rate initiative.</p>	<p><b>Early Childcare and Education/Youth Services:</b></p> <p><b>\$24 million</b> increase in funding for Summer Rising.</p> <p><b>Aging Services:</b></p> <p>All discretionary funding restored to FY20 levels or higher by more than \$4.8 million.</p> <p><b>No increase in DFTA funding</b> for home-delivered meals.</p> <p><b>Human Services Sector:</b></p> <p><b>\$60 million</b> for the Indirect Cost Rates initiative. This is the first investment in the \$120 million promised in the executive budget to fully fund the initiative over two years.</p> <p><b>One-time \$24 million bonus</b> of human services workers in recognition of their work.</p> <p><b>No COLA.</b></p>	<p><b>Community Care Plan:</b></p> <p><b>\$39.4 million</b> to fund the first year of the Community Care Plan which will invest significant funding in senior centers, NORCs, and other community-based services for older adults. It will support 25 new senior centers in communities of color as well as services for senior adults living in their homes.</p> <p><b>Alternatives to Incarceration:</b></p> <p><b>Almost \$14.5 million</b> for programs which provide individuals involved in the criminal justice system with alternatives to pre-trial detention, jail, or prison. The programs include community service and substance abuse counseling, as well as short-term and long-term housing, job placement, and vocational training.</p> <p><b>AAPI Community Support Initiative:</b></p> <p><b>\$4 million</b> for the creation of the AAPI Community Support initiative aimed at providing direct services, mental health supports, youth programs, and racial literacy for Asian American community members in light of violence against the AAPI community.</p>
